

Monday 26 October: International Committee-organised Presentation re Cambodia Rural Student Trust (CRST) 'Sky Hydrant' project Our Guest Speakers, Aviv and Jessica Palti, gave an extraordinarily professional presentation related to a potential Water, Sanitation and Hygiene project in Cambodia. It ticked all the boxes of being a successful 'developing nations' project in that it would be locally driven and managed as well as also enabling the creation of educational and economic opportunity in addition to its health benefits. At the Board meeting the following week the Board accepted the recommendation of our International Committee and endorsed the allocation of a generous and anonymous donation toward establishing the project as a pilot project. Other clubs are being sought as partners - members of some attended the meeting to hear the presentation - and an application will be made for a matching District grant. Congratulations to our hard-working International Committee for their enthusiastic work on this. A copy of the presentation is attached to this email. Monday 9 November: (NAIDOC) Week

This Meeting was at the beginning of National Aboriginal & Islanders Day Observance Committee. Rather than having our usual Acknowledgement of Country at the beginning we instead listened to Indigenous leader, Professor Megan Davis, read out the Uluru Statement from the Heart on the floor of the First Nations Convention at which it was endorsed in 2017. I introduced this variation by asking those present to consider it akin to having a guest speaker rather to see it as anything 'political'. Rotary's non-political stance in the world only ever prevents the taking of collective political action not the hearing of information directly from its source which will enable us to individually determine our own opinion. Monday 1 November: Board Meeting



I thank the Board for their willingness to attend a meeting on Cup Eve. They are indeed All Saints (pun intended).

At this meeting, the following business was conducted in addition to the Sky Hydrant item mentioned above:

- Treasurer Steve presented financial reports for endorsement and Gerard and Phil undertook to review them to provide the necessary 'fair and true' statement required by CAV.
- Agreed that AGM take place at commencement of Club meeting on Monday 30 November. Paperwork has been distributed by Chris. Thanks.
- COVID writing competition closing date extended to last day of Term 4 (18 December)
- Planning for 'Survivor Awards' for East Keilor small businesses during pandemic is underway with eligibility (geographic area, size etc) and selection criteria generally agreed.
- MV Art Show Committee has commenced its work with first joint meeting already held. Provisionally planned for weekend of 14-16 May 2021.
- Endorsement of Application made to Foundation for VCE scholarship for a student to be selected by St Albans SC where our Interact Club operates.
- Phil conducted an initial 'Supporting the Environment" consultation with Board, presenting an extensive range of environmental options available for consideration. That comprehensive list will be whittled down in coming months to a more manageable and achievable number, possibly related to tree plantings in partnership with MV City Council et al and also something 'educational' in partnership with a local school.
- Yvonne indicated that she would initiate a revamp of the Club website so that it will become more like a virtual 'information brochure' about who we are and what we do rather than our 'family photo album'. She also indicated that her PETS training was about to start.
- Reviewed the following group of District 9800 Policies required for legislative compliance about our social interactions viz:
- o Protection policy
- o Sexual Harassment policy
- o Privacy policy

The most critical of these in application is the Protection Policy and the Board believed, that in addition to the distribution of these attached policies, a formal overview of it needs to be presented at a Club meeting. Guest Speaker - Des Tobin - RAM - Just a man called Phonse



Des Tobin has written a book about his father, Phonse. He begin by thanking and respecting Rotary and other service clubs for their contributions to the community. He acknowledged that he has known Lou Gionfriddo, a member of this Club for many years.

Phonse was a charter member of the Rotary Club of North Melbourne. He was a Paul Harris fellow. When he died in 1993 his Rotary club awarded a \$500 grant to three or four local community groups. This has been done for 26 years in his memory. Tobin Brothers set up a Foundation to help worthy causes within the community.

In 2018 Des wrote a book entitled "Just a man called Phonse".

Des is 82 years old. He is the second of four children. He has an older brother, Barry, a younger brother, Gavan, as well as a sister, Denise. Des played cricket and was a wicket keeper. He also enjoyed diving and pole vaulting, even though he was only 5'4" tall.

He left school at 15 to become an apprentice panel beater which he didn't enjoy. He also played football for North Melbourne VFA team. He had many different occupations and eventually went to Queensland where he met his beautiful wife Margaret whom he married 58 years ago. They have four children and 11 grandchildren.

In 1961 he became the CEO of Tobin Brothers until his retirement in 2002. He spent 45 years in funeral services which he found to be rewarding, but stressful at times. He now enjoys playing golf, spending time with his grand children and writing. He has written six family stories and has a website www.destobin.com.au

Phonse or Alphonse Vincent Tobin was born in 1905. He was a twin. Sadly, his twin, Bernard died, aged only a few days. He had three brothers, Leo, Kevin, Noel and Tom and a sister, Mary. While his love for the theater was one of his many interests, he was a store man, a soldier, a fireman and a successful amateur athlete. Once, whilst a fireman, he was inspecting fire equipment in a theatre. He was spoken to in a haughty tone by woman whom he saw was Dame Nellie Melba. He admonished her for her tone. He felt everyone had a right to be spoken to civilly.

He married Vera Crough and they had Barry, Des, Denise, and Gavan. They lived in Malvern and he operated AV Tobin from Glenferrie Rd. His sons attended De La Salle College. While living in Malvern He became president of the North Melbourne Football Club. In the 1980s he and vera moved to Kew. He still took a keen interest in Rotary, racehorse and greyhound owning. He enjoyed gambling and was a heavy smoker, dying from emphysema in 1993.

Phonse stood up for the downtrodden and mixed with all classes of people with ease. He was strong willed, headstrong and had self belief. In 1952 he helped talk down a psychiatric patient who had climbed a railway tower in Royal Park. He climbed the tower to negotiate with the man Clive Lambert. He shared a cigarette with the man and waited until almost midnight to meet him, as promised, after professionals talked him down.

Phonse had and engaging personality, was genuine, unforgettable and an attention seeker. Des told us that there are quite a few attention seekers in the family.

He thanked our Club for giving him the opportunity to tell his father's story. He asked if there were any questions. He has generously given Michael some copies of his book to give away to any Club Member who is interested.


Gerard Mahoney - Asked about Phonse's brothers and said that his father, Bill Mahoney, knew the Tobin family.

Michael Donnelly - How did you start your research? Dad had written 40 or 50 pages of memories which was a great start. He had also told us a lot of stories.

Lou Gionfriddo - How long did it take to write the book? 2 - 2.5 years.

John Walsh - John worked part time for the company years ago so had memories of the Tobin Bothers Business.

Minh Nguyen - remembered Tobin Bothers Funerals in Saigon. Are they related? No, but he will be interested to research that.





Guest Speaker - Bill Oakley - RAM - Rotarians Against Malaria



Bill Oakley - Rotarians Against Malaria - Malaria has been around for around 1000 years.

Malaria is caused by the Plasmodium parasite. The parasite can be spread to humans through the bites of infected mosquitoes. There are many different types of plasmodium parasite, but only 5 types cause malaria in humans.


There were 218 Million cases in the world last year. Rotary would like to see its eradication by 2050. Africa and India are the main areas of infection. It is hoped that there will be a 40% reduction in infections by 2030. Disappointingly, the decline has slowed. In 2018 trials of a preventative vaccine have been 40% effective. It is hoped that an additional 20 countries will soon be Malaria free.

Questions from our Members -

RAM is a part of RAWCS Rotary Australian World Community Service. RAM operates in Australia and New Zealand. Many funds have been collected by the former Brimbank Rotary Club's foreign coin collecting drive.

Covid 19 is a new virus which has a ten times higher mortality rate. It will be miraculous if we can get a Covid Vaccine. Ed. It's amazing what can happen in a few weeks!

RAM has several resources and is present on a variety of social media platforms. A <u>video</u> made by Primary School Students in a Rotary competition helps raise awareness in Malaria prone areas.

RAM was started in the early 1990s from a proposal by Dr Brian Handley of the Rotary Club of Chatswood (NSW) who was concerned about the surge in malaria incidence after the discontinuation of DDT-based malaria control programs. RAM was launched in 1995 in Tulagi, Solomon Islands by the Rotary Club of Honiara and Rotary District 9600. In 1997 Ron Seddon and The Rotary Club of Port Moresby initiated the highly successful Adopt a Village program to encourage Australian Rotary Clubs to fund nets in PNG on a village-by-village basis. The Adopt A Village program was then successfully implemented in the Solomon Islands. In 1998 Rotary Australia World Community Service adopted RAM as an approved multi-district project. In 2005, RAM expanded its support to the National Malaria Control Program in Timor Leste. There are now RAM committees in each of the 21 Rotary districts in Australia, which raise funds to support programs to control and eliminate malaria.

A message from President Nominee Deb Sloggett

Hi team,

Thankyou so much for attending the meeting last night to discuss our CRST WASH project. Apologies to Barbara and John for not letting them in to the Zoom meeting sooner.

The aim of the meeting was to discuss the potential for raising funds for the project in preparation for submitting the international district grant. The project is costed at \$20,000 so we need to have a plan as to how to raise this money to promote confidence and we would be much more likely to achieve receipt of a grant. We don't have to have the money in hand so pledges for money will be great too. The grant must be submitted this year, in the next few weeks, so we have a greater opportunity of getting a grant in the first half of the Rotary year. It may be more challenging next year as if any money is left it may be shared around.

There are others working on this as well, so it is not all up to us to organize, however as the host club we have the opportunity of being a major player and working on collaborations with other clubs and people.

Some great ideas were discussed

- 1. Morning tea with the DG, next session is planned for Saturday December the 5th Action Deb will talk with Jen Foster to see if can be promoted at this forum
- 2. Cluster meeting (Michaels group with his other hat as AG) Action: it was thought better if Maria Hicks from Passport Club could raise at this group Michael will support once the subject brought up. Deb will talk to Maria.
- 3. One on one chats with other Rotary Clubs, however this may be for future fund raising as this year is running out.

We then discussed how great this project is and how it could be more than just a water project. Consideration for promoting as our Centenary Project and twinning it with the Environment Project that Phil is working on re tree planting. It is also Education, Youth and Community. Yvonne had an idea re schools being involved and helping to raise funds as the water project is based in schools, anyway we all agreed that there is great potential, and it could be a Club Super Project

Future action:

Setting up a RAWCs account for the project - Passport Club want to do this as if the project becomes global then Aviv will be project manager and as he is a member of the Passport Club it makes sense to have the account managed by them submitting the grant in the next couple of weeks. Keilor East need to approve formally, Michael to sign off on and we need an account for the grant money. I think we need a stand-alone account for grant money so we can't just put in our International account, but I will have to check Rotary Foundation rules I apologise if i have forgotten anything but it was an exciting chat and so much to look forward to
