In Preparation for our October 26th Meeting President Michael sent out this message -



Board Report - President Michael Donnelly

October 5th, 2020





Report from BOARD MEETING held Monday 5 October 2020

At this meeting, the Board:

- decided that the first 'get together' of 2021 calendar year shall be on 18 January 2021 and could be with other clubs if anything is being organised.
- determined to hold the 2020 AGM in late November
- endorsed the proposal from the International Committee to seek D9800 matching grant funding for the Rural Sky Hydrant (aka Project W)
- noted the extension of the deadline for the COVID writing competition
- considered the RCKE financial reports and approved the 2020-21 Budget as amended
- decided not to hold future Board meetings via Zoom on the same night as Club meetings. Thus they will be held on the first Monday of each month (excluding January) on which there is not a Club meeting
- endorsed the use of a Project Selection Tool which provides criteria by which the Board can determine whether to approve, request re-submission or reject any proposed project.
- Endorsed a set of Guidelines that will inform the Distribution of Charitable Funds
- Endorsed an initial sub-set of D9800 Policies that individual clubs are required to endorse as a minimum standard of their recognition of the need for compliance under Australian and Victorian law as well for compliance with RI requirements. They are attached to this email.

The process of amending/endorsing these D9800 Policies commenced at this Board meeting and will continue over our next two Board meetings. As each group of Policies is endorsed, they will be distributed to every Club member and will eventually be put on the club website as part of its forthcoming makeover (thanks for your initiative on this, Yvonne).

Also attached are:

- a FAQ document from D9800 which explains the rationale for requiring clubs to have such policies.
- An Index of the full set of Policies to be amended/endorsed over the remainder of 2020

While we acknowledge that very few of you are highly attracted to such legal and bureaucratic necessities as policy development and endorsement and understandably prefer 'having fun and fellowship while supporting others', we still hope that you will take the time to run your eyes over these Policies. They will serve no purpose if this process merely becomes a 'box ticking' exercise by the Board.






The Board continues to consider the following 'unresolved' matters:

Guest Speaker - Rowan McClean - Vietnam Communities Support - 19th October 2020



Rowan McClean - Rowan is the District 9800 Chair for Club Service. He let us know that our District Governor's Philip Archer's mother died. We were very sad to hear this and extend our sympathy and understanding to Philip and his family at this difficult time. The Club Service Role is that of ensuring the smooth running of Rotary Clubs.

Progress in Vietnam - The Registered Charity, Vietnam Communities Support, was set up over 10 years ago. The challenges included Suspicion, Language, Decision Making from the top down. Punctuality - always late, is seemingly a cultural difference. The Rotary Clubs of Bacchus Marsh, <u>Glenferrie</u> and Brighton are among the supporters of this charity

The Charity saw 3 stages of assistance as being necessary.

- 1. Education of most needy children.
- 2. Infrastructure and amenities improvements
- 3. Community development Projects

Scott Peppin from the Rotary Club of Bacchus Marsh does a lot of work for this organization.

The facilities included

- 1. Library
- Bicycles helped students to get to school
- 3. Clean Water RC North Balwyn
- 4. Schools heaters and fans, desks and chairs, bikes and laptops
- 5. and Kindergartens outdoor play equipment, blankets, food refrigeration and luncheon supplements
- 6. Ultrasound machine at Minh Hac Clinic two doctors have been trained
- 7. Medical Clinics Computerization of medical records, medicines, equipment for small businesses e.g. hairdressers
- 8. Western Toilets
- 9. Community Centres Community Library, toilets, kitchen, paved play areas. These are valuable for Social Integration.
- 10. Bang Gia teachers, furniture, pig raising breaking the poverty cycle.
- 11. Decorative Leaves Project first checked Vietrade feasibility, research, wholesale and retail, farmers were selected, management team to Ben Tre. Businessman Mr Thanh helped, planting was conducted, and a nursery built.

How can Rotary Grants be obtained for joint projects happen when there are no Rotary Clubs in Vietnam? Rotary accepts work with partner organizations or work with a Thai Rotary Club



Bacchus Marsh Rotary Club

YEN LUAT, PHU THO PROVINCE, Vietnam (our long-term project). September 2014 to NOW.

After meeting with local officials in Hanoi, Vietnam, in September 2014, an interim report was prepared outlining the needs of a small village of 3500 poor subsistence farmers on the Red River, Yen Luat, North Vietnam. As there is no Rotary International presence in Vietnam, we have established links with the NGO Overseas Kids Foundation (OKF) in Hanoi and ably assisted by the Rotary Club of Balwyn North to provide support to this community.

Three major areas of support were identified: Education, Infrastructure and Subsistence Income enterprises.

CRST NGO - It was another great day with Project R and Plastic Free Village (PFV) teams to lead the clean-up activity in Preah Dak commune with local villagers. This is to show how grateful we are to our nature. We hope that this activity will encourage the villagers to be more involved in reducing single-use plastics and to lead their village to be a Plastic Free Village. CRST Website.

Project W - Keilor East Rotary is donating to CRST's Project W which aims to initially provide clean water for four rural schools and their communities. The aim is to apply for a Rotary District Grant to add to bour donations and raised funds to supply four Sky Hydrants which filter water. Investigations and surveys have been undertaken by 60 CRST university students. The Sky Hydrants cost \$3000 AUD. The installed cost per school, depending on existing infrastructure is \$6000.

Our students receive the best education possible and in return, contribute back to society. Our NGO sponsors our students' education, health and dental care, life-skill courses and monthly living allowances

Project Y Frozen Yogurt

In August 2015 we opened our very first Educational Social Enterprise store!! You can find us in Night Market Street, Siem Reap. Our store is open 7 days a week and fully staffed by our CRST students who we mentored on running a successful business All profits from this store is put back into our NGO for further education and activities.

PROJECT G

Project G, as in G for Girls!! This project is focused on bringing women's health education and sustainable feminine hygiene solutions to girls in rural Cambodia.

Around the world, girls and women resort to using rags, mattress stuffing, banana leaves, feathers, and even cow dung to manage their menstruation. Without basic hygiene education and sanitation, rural girls often miss many days of school, ultimately dropping out. Partnering with Days for Girls, we will provide a safe, beautiful, washable, and long-lasting alternative — along with vital health education. In less than 10 years, Days for Girls have reached one million girls and women in over 100 countries - and through Project G, we will be bringing this empowering program to rural Cambodia.

New Student Program

Our student management team created a comprehensive process including tests, interviews and family visits to ensure that the new students we are undertaking to sponsor at High School or University are keen to study and come from poor rural families.

819 students took the written test. 128 students were interviewed. We visited 53 students' homes to access their family and living situation, and in 2019 we accepted 20 new students!!

AND NOW....

We are getting ready to find new students to join the CRST family for the 2020-2021 academic year!!

This process of interviewing and testing is typically undertaken in May-July, for the academic year commencing in September.




