Later in the week Phil O'Brien sent this overview of the 2023 MVAS.

Over the three days of 19 to 21 May, 2023, the 9th Moonee Valley Art Show (MVAS) was held at St. Bernard's College Essendon.

This event attracted a record number of entries from artists across Australia and we were able to select and present approximately 320 quality pieces of art covering all mediums and genres of painting as well as photography.

There is no other Art Show of this kind in our northwestern region of Melbourne and, after nine years, the MVAS has an increasing awareness and profile in the local community. Show promotion was solid using Real Estate display boards, flyers (windows, cafes and letter boxes) and social media. Sales of Art, while not as high as previous years, was pleasing given the obvious cost pressures on households at the moment.

The Gala evening was a success with sponsor representatives, Club member and friends, artists and the public enjoying the night and getting early access to the art on sale.

The MVAS is the major annual fundraiser for both Clubs and profit made will be split between the two Rotary Clubs supporting our community service projects both locally and overseas.

Sponsor support has continued to be solid, and we will maintain visibility of their businesses on MVAS and Club websites and social media for the next 12 months. Feedback received from sponsor representatives has been positive and we look forward to ongoing relationships.

Letter from our Cambodian Rotaract Student - Sokhey

Hello David, Deb, and the Rotary Club of Keilor East.

I hope you are doing well, and I am great here.

I would like to share with you again about my studies at Pannasastra University and TDSO. First, I would like to let you know that my study at the IEAP program has not changed much, but a little bit has been changed by my teacher. He went to visit his grandson, and we are going to have another teacher to replace him. A small challenge is that the new one is too strict. I am scared to ask him when I don't understand. He did not allow the students to talk in the class. That is why I cannot ask my friends either. Anyway, the solution is that I set up a new plan to research the words or something I am not clear about. Moreover, I am going to be brave and talk to him to build my confidence and a good connection with him. The second is that I would like to let you know about my study at TDSO (Teacher Development Support Organization). Although I am not going to be a teacher, I am pleased to join this cause. I learn a lot from there, and I feel confident that I have a specific skill to develop. If I have no sponsor from CRST, I still have a way to continue my studies. I really thank you to the people who teach me a lot and the volunteer department that urges me to study there. I am going to have a final exam next week in TDSO.

The sports activity this month is so good. It is not strange to me, as I ride the bike every day to school and activities with CRST. Actually, every weekend I always ride my bike to Angkor Wat. I went alone. I want to spend two or three hours per week with myself, finding myself. I ride my bike, view the nature of plants, and relax with the voice of the birds. Take the fresh air to heal my toxic things for a whole week. I always go alone, and on that day, I went with many people. However, I can still learn about it. I can receive a different feeling. I feel good riding the bike and talking about something with them. On that day, I encountered so many situations. Some of them broke the bike, and some were really tired because they did not spend much time riding it, but we can still complete it. Anyway, I am so happy to join this activity. It makes me laugh a lot.

I had to join four public events that were incorrectly advertised by PUC and social media. I would like to raise it as one of my interests. I joined an event that I found on social media, but it was so good and effective. I joined an event that talked about reading and sharing. I am really interested in it. I have no plan to join it, so I have to change my plan to join it. I change my class at TDSO to the afternoon, and I go to join the event in the morning. I went there with Chhean; she is one of the CRST students. We face challenges because we don't know where the event runs. We drive around the place again and again to make sure it is the right place. We used Google Maps to arrive there. After we arrived there, we were afraid to get in because we felt that the place was very famous, and we didn't know where to go further. However, we wouldn't give up, so we decided to ask the security guard, and he told us. We got a warm welcome from them. In the middle of that time, I learned from them how to share and motivate myself to love reading. I spent two or three hours listening to them and also sharing with them. I never recognized them before, but I feel we are on the same page and easy to get along with. Although I feel upset to find it, after I joined this event, I don't regret spending my time on it. I plan to find new lessons outside and learn from them.

This is all about my special activities in August and I am waiting to hear from you back. Please look forward to seeing my beautiful pictures.

Letter from our Cambodian Secondary Student - Sokny

Hello Barbara, John and Members of the Rotary Club of Keilor East.

I hope everything is going smoothly for you.

Today I would like to share with you some activities that I've done in this month such as my studies, sharing class and celebrating the 10th anniversary of my grandfather's death.

Firstly, I would like to share with you my studies. This month is the last month of my grade 12 class, as I finished my semester on August 21 and 22. The results have also been released; I got the first rank as before; generally speaking, I got the first rank for a whole year. And this is the big thing that I achieved in 2023. My next goal is to get an A in the baccalaureate examination (Bac II) in the next few months, which will take place on November 6–7, 2023. Bac II is the process of Cambodia's education to test the ability of grade 12 students after they graduate; you can also call it an exit exam. Students who receive A will receive many prizes, such as scholarships for university classes, cash prizes, computer, motorcycles, certificates, and especially honors for themselves, their families, and schools, as well as they can meet the Prime Minister at the awards ceremony and others prize. After the exam day, we organized a small ceremony for the teachers by preparing some fruits and gifts to apologize to the teachers for the mistakes we made. Teachers also wished us success on the upcoming exam day and we took a lot of pictures at the moment.

Secondly, I attended a sharing class with teacher Seyha. On that day, he brought four topics for teaching to our students. The four topics are: brain work, conscious mind and subconscious mind, four stages of learning (NLP = Neurons Language Program), and four stages of leadership development. In addition, he taught us why we need to learn to understand, the definition of smart words, and the reason why people are prone to giving up something. In my opinion, everyone has to learn to understand the whole world, to know new things, to know people and how to live with people around them, and also to develop themselves, their families, and their nation. On the other hand, the definition of smart for me is that just being able to remember what others can remember is enough. Moreover, I think that the reason why people are prone to giving up may be due to their thinking only negatively, procrastinating to accomplish something, and so on. His explanation is really a good and appropriate mindset for me, and he even mentioned some things that I have experienced, both work experience and learning.

Thirdly, I'm going to share with you celebrating the 10th anniversary of my grandfather's death. August 26, 2023, is the tenth anniversary of my grandfather's death. My grandfather, Ron Rien, died ten years ago of a chronic illness at the age of 61. He was my father's father. My family made a meal and went to the pagoda to dedicate him and perform a ritual to reach the spirit of my grandfather through a Buddhist ceremony. We got up early in the morning to cook and went to the pagoda where his ashes of bone were kept. After listening to the prayers and sermons, we returned and had lunch together at my grandmother's house. It was an unforgettable time.

Monday August 28th, 2023 - Guest Speaker - Tony Thomas - The Mystery of the Dutch Colonists at Palm Valley

On Monday August 28th our Guest Speaker was our own Tony Thomas who spoke about the research he and an associate, Les Hiddins, have been doing about probable Dutch settlement in central Australia prior to Captain Cook's landing in 1770. The following is from our new club <u>website</u>.

At our meeting of August 28, speaker Tony Thomas spelt out the historical mystery of Dutch colonists in Australia . Australia's "Bush Tucker Man", Major Les Hiddins, has spent 30 years investigating whether 90 survivors from the wreck of the Dutch 'great ship' Concordia in 1708 landed on the NW coast and trekked 2000km east to approximately Palm Valley, where they settled and lived on fish, yams, maize and game. A British military explorers' party came across the 300 descendants there in 1832 and stayed with them eight days. A detailed report of this surfaced in the Leeds Mercury of 1834.

By the time the first explorers passed through the centre in 1860-70, no physical trace of the Dutch was in evidence. Yet many independent facts corroborate the "Dutch settlers" story. If true it must cause a re-write of the history of white settlement in Australia. Academic historians show no interest so far.

After the talk some members asked for a link to Tony's published story, and link to further details of Les Hiddins research. These links are here and <

Wednesday 31st August - Lindsay Fox Car Collection Visit

On Thursday August 31st, a group of interested members who were free, gathered at the Lindsay Fox Car Collection Museum in Docklands for a guided tour of the facility.

The Fox Classic Car Collection, housed in the historic Queen's Warehouse, contains dozens of the world's most rare and prestigious vehicles.

These cars have been collected over a 50-year period by Lindsay Fox, Founder of Australian logistics company Linfox, and donated to a Trust to raise funds for charity and for the public to enjoy. Lindsay has a passion for classic vehicles, with his collection including models from Mercedes Benz, Jaguar, Porsche, Ferrari, Bentley, Volkswagen, Ford, Rolls Royce, MG, Lexus and Nissan between 1923 and 2020.

Some vehicles have previously been owned by Ringo Starr, Bing Crosby and Bob Jane to name a few.

The collection is steeped in history, one-off prototypes, and cars that dreams are made of.

We were fortunate to have a guided tour of the wonderful collection of cars. Lindsay has many more cars stored in a hangar at Essendon Airport.




