



#### **Tony Thomas**

Tony grew up in Perth, Western Australia with both parents as journalists and members of the Communist Party. The family was always having conversations about politics. Tony's daughter from his first marriage, Ros, is a TV and print journalist. Tony followed his parents into journalism in Perth in the 1960s, then with The Age in the Canberra Press Gallery in the 1970s. (He settled in Melbourne in 1981). In contrast to his upbringing, Tony now places himself on the right of the political spectrum.

When he came to Melbourne Tony joined the Rotary Club of Highpoint/ Maribyrnong,. The Club eventually handed back their charter, so he joined Rotary Central Melbourne which met for breakfast. Tony visited West New Britain with Rotary where they installed much needed water tanks in 2003. 10 years ago, Melbourne Central Sunrise Rotary Club formed a Probus Club called Sunrise Probus, which now has 120 members.

Tony has always been a "journo" with his family heritage of writing since the 1930s. There has been 90 years of journalism in his family.

Moving from the West, Tony worked as a journalist during the Whitlam years. He studied economics, whilst working, in order to assist with his writing on economic matters.

It was a world of deadlines, telex and faxes. There were no word processors. He literally cut and paste typewriter texts on the floor with a pot of glue. They were amazing times - Rex Connor and the loans affair, Jim Cairns and Junie Morosi.


After a decade Tony moved to the Business Review Weekly Magazine startup. His first cover story got a writ from a unionist in the Pilbara, his only one ever.


For 20 years Tony wrote four pages of accountancy news a week, plus whatever else came up. Now he writes when he wants and what he wants.


Tony Retired in 2001. By that time and after writing half a dozen books, he began writing for Quadrant and is now on essay 399.

Five years ago, he retired and played tennis. Around that time, he was diagnosed with multiple myeloma. He has undergone treatment, recovered, and has written 4 more books.

He has been married to Margaret for 35 years, his most successful marriage yet. He has two daughters, one is a travel agent, the other a bank executive. We warmly welcome Tony Thomas to Keilor East Rotary and wish him well on his continued Rotary journey.








Guest Speakers - Rom and Paul Kucera - Beekeeping





Rom Kucera's father and grandfather had been involved in keeping bees years ago, but it wasn't until Rom and his son Paul undertook a weekend course back in 2011 that they both became hooked on the pastime. They went from one beehive back then to over twenty hives now. Most hives are in the suburbs, but a few are at Heathcote. Rom lives at 5 Brunel Street in Aberfeldie and he sells some of his honey from a Facebook page entitled Brunel No.5 – Pure Australian Honey. They are members of the newly formed Moonee Valley Beekeepers Club.

A major part of Beekeeping is carrying out Inspections of the hive to make sure that the colony is healthy. Bees are the chief pollinators required for fruits, vegetables and nuts to produce crops. They often travel up to 5kms from their hive daily collecting nectar only to return, a long way for a little bee. Worker bees have a six-week lifespan. They have superior navigation skills. Bees also seem to get to know their keeper. It is important to stay calm around the hives and to not make sudden movements which bees might perceive as aggressive.

The queen bee can live for years. In the swarming season bees can leave the overcrowded colony to set up another colony. It is an indicator of the wellbeing of the colony. The Queen sends off pheromones which call the bees.

While they were giving their presentation about Bee keeping Rom and Paul shared a video in the background which showed them, dressed in protective clothing, inspecting one of their hives. They were checking the wooden brood frames which hang in box. In Spring and Summer, the Queen Bee can lay 2000 eggs per day and a hive population can swell to 60,000 bees.

A third type of bee, the drone, mates with the Queen Bee in mid to late Spring. They also gorge on honey. A Queen bee is larger than the worker bees but smaller than a drone. The Queen emits a high-pitched sound like an alarm. When a Super or Top Box is added to the top of a Brood Box the bees draw wax from their bodies to make the hexagonal wax structure which holds the honey. The honey is a mixture of fructose and glucose. One bee produces about a teaspoon of honey, so it is vital that bees are cared for. The population of the world needs bees to pollinate crops for food.

The bees take about three weeks to hatch and take flight to seek nectar and pollen. They do a waggle dance at the hive entrance to communicate to other bees about the whereabouts of nectar supplies. To be labelled as a specific type of honey e.g., Manuka, Leatherwood, Red Gum etc. the bees must collect 90% of the nectar from that species.

When checking hives, beekeepers look for anything sinister. By that, they check in the dark corners for small beetles, the tip of a pen sized, which taint the honeycomb. There are also moths and a type of bacteria which thrives in the hive's 36 -37-degree temperatures.

One of the nastiest invaders is <u>Varroa mite</u> which we are endeavouring to keep out of Australia by strict border controls. It is parasitic so it is vital that it never comes to our country. Around Townsville there are Asian Bees which are very aggressive. It is important that they are eradicated before they take hold. It is thought that our native bees might be immune to Varroa mite.

Beekeepers need to be registered with Agriculture Victoria. Bees are considered to be livestock and need to be cared for using correct codes of practice. There is scientific research being undertaken all the time. Bee venom might prove useful, as might Royal Jelly. Some pure honey is being used in wound care in hospitals and medical practices.

Bee's wax is being used to make eco friendly sandwich wrap.

We are very grateful to Rom and Paul for giving us such a comprehensive presentation on Beekeeping. They were able to answer many questions from members and are open to us purchasing honey from their Facebook page.



We were also pleased to welcome John McCaskill from <u>Rotarians for Bees</u> group. He joined us for the evening. This group was formed about four years ago. And has received great support from councils such as Moonee Valley City Council.
